



- 20% weighting on impact in the REF assessment exercise


How can RDT help?

The Concordat to Support the Career Development of Researchers


- Principle 3: Researchers are equipped and supported to be adaptable and flexible in an increasingly diverse, mobile, global research environment
- Principle 4: The importance of researchers' personal and career development and lifelong learning, is clearly recognised and promoted at all stages of their career
- Principle 5: Individual researchers share the responsibility for and the need to pro-actively engage in their own personal and career development and lifelong learning

Your Supervisor and You

What do you want from your Supervisor?



What do you think they want from you?

"Formal supervisory meetings, at which substantial discussion of research progress and plans takes place, should be held at least twice a term [...] A meeting with the supervisor, if requested by the student, will take place within one week, as far as practicable."

How do you prepare for a meeting with your supervisor?

- Submit drafts in lots of time for your supervisor to read them
- Summarise your progress since your last meeting so that you have it clear in your mind
- Make a list of any questions that have been hounding you
- Make a list of anything you need from your supervisor before you can continue
- Send this agenda to your supervisor in advance if at all possible

In the Meeting

- Review you progress and update your supervisor on new developments
- Explore any problems, interpretations, issues and results
- Clarify your next steps and identify tasks to be completed either by you or your supervisor
- Set Goals to be completed by the next meeting
- Set a date for the next meeting

It is considered good practice for the student to draw up a record of formal supervisory meetings for approval by the supervisor. This should include the date of the meeting and a summary of the content of the meeting and of future actions to be performed.






